

UP IN THE ATTIC: CORRESPONDENCE LEARNING REVISITED

Introduction

In 2023, the Academy of Accounting Historians (AAH) proudly celebrates its Golden Anniversary (1973-2023) reflecting fifty productive years. Moreover, evidence discovered in an recently attic manifests the profession accounting fostering correspondence school as a learning option in 1942—eighty-one years ago during the transformational World War II period.

"The 1940s Education: Chronology" Encyclopedia.com presented by (https://www.encyclopedia.com, retrieved on 03/09/23) reports that in 1942, the United States Armed Forces offering Institute commenced correspondence courses from the University of Wisconsin—Madison. Moreover, by the conclusion of 1946, the Institute had enrolled 800,000 military veterans in its correspondence courses.

1946, Gilman Stephen ("Correspondence Courses in the Accounting Education Program," The Accounting Review, Vol. 21, No. 4, pp. 396-404) reflected on the merits/ advantages shortcomings/ and disadvantages correspondence of instruction and methods. He even mentioned Columbia University.

Internet and WiFi coupled with the emergence of COVID-19 spurred online education/learning and remote education/learning to new heights and prevalence today. These modes of education provide the benefit of learning from "home" along with a measure of

students. However, the remote format requires scheduled "class" times producing more accountability for the students. In order to remain viable in these

changing times, even accounting programs have integrated such academic innovations.

On the "Dukes of Hazzard" television show (1979-1985), Bo Duke (John Schneider) mentioned option the of correspondence school and distance learning. As an inept driver nearly hit Bo driving the "General Lee," Bo upsettingly wondered out loud if the other driver learned how to drive and earned his drivers license through correspondence school.

Attic Find

While performing the arduous and lengthy task of cleaning out my late mother's spacious attic resembling a jam-packed cavity, I found myself amid a treasure trove of surprises. Four massive trunks packed with books published in the 1800s and 1900s captured curious my accounting attention. As an historian, introduced to the dynamic field of accounting history by Dr. Dale Flesher at Ole Miss in 1988, I closely examined a paperback book with the title The World Almanac, 1942. On the top of page 2A of the brittle publication in genuine attic condition, I delightfully found an advertisement/promotion promising: GOOD SALARY, A NEW HOME, CAR, FINE and **BANK** ACCOUNT. The following verbiage from pages 2A and 3A presents the correspondence learning sales pitch.

To the man who wants to enjoy an ACCOUNTANT'S CAREER

IF you're that man, here's something that will interest you.

Not a magic formula—not a get-rich quick scheme—but something more substantial, more practical.

Of course, you yourself need something more than just the ambition to be an accountant.

You've got to pay the price—be willing to study earnestly, thoroughly.

Still, wouldn't it be worth your while to sacrifice some of your leisure in favor of interesting home study—over a comparatively brief period in your life? Always provided that the rewards were good—a salary of \$2,000 to \$10,000?

Think of the thrill of cashing a goodsized salary check! Of building a modern home! Of cruising about town in a new car! Of swelling your bank account!

Those are everyday events in the life of many accountants who, mind you, doesn't have to kill himself with work to attain them. His duties are interestingly varied and of real worth to his employers. He has standing!

Do you feel that such things aren't for you? Well, don't be too sure. Very possibly they can be.

Why not, like so many before you, investigate LaSalle's modern Problem Method of training for an accountancy position?

Instantly you'll appreciate its merits. You'll realize it's practical and thorough. Yet it's not expensive—considering time required and results gained.

Conclusion

The benefits of accounting history research are immense. Robert H. ("Research Needs Parker in History," Accounting The Accounting Historians Journal. Vol. 4, No. 2, Fall 1977, pp. 1-28) shared guidance on what to look for in accounting history research. He urged the study of the development accounting of academic conjunction with the influence of the environment and changes in societal needs on accounting.

COVID-19 and technology merely exploded the utilization of the online/remote delivery format. - international profile and recognition the individual should have a global profile and not one simply within his/her country;
- the quality, importance and originality of the individual's research program;
- the scholar's scope of work, publication record in various academic journals and edited volumes;
- his/her active participation in the academy (in the generic sense and not only the Academy of Accounting Historians), including contributions to the field as journal editor, editorial board member, conferences, etc.;
- the individual's work and efforts to popularize history and accounting history, including editing and publication of works, and efforts to bring accounting history's past into the present through the publication of old documents or records or the republication of forgotten texts; and
- the individual's participation in the training of doctoral students, support and mentorship of junior colleagues including those whose mother tongue is not English.

The Academy of Accounting Historians Section was honored to name Gary Spraakman a Life Member of the AAH Section for his extensive and innovative service to The Academy, along with his robust research pursuits. In addition to serving as a past Academy president, Dr. Spraakman is the creator and manager of the AAH's popular Brown Bag and webinar series of research presentations.



2023 Alfred R. Roberts Memorial Research Award

The Alfred R. Roberts Memorial Research Award is named in honor of Dr. Alfred R. Roberts, second President and long-serving Secretary of the Academy and provides grants for research which seek to support the 35 goals identified by Professor Emeritus Richard Vangermeersch as to accounting history research, as identified in the April 2012 issue of the *Accounting Historians Notebook*. Grants are awarded to Academy members for the actualization of ideas to increase the scope of the history of accounting.

2023 Thomas J. Burns Biographical Research Award

The Academy of Accounting Historians annually honors individual as the recipient of the Thomas J. Burns Biographical Research Award for outstanding biographical research in the discipline of accountancy. 2023 recipient of the Thomas J. Biographical Burns Research Diane Award was Roberts. Professor of Accounting at the University of San Francisco, for her 2022 publication of:



"Gender stereotyping in public accounting: Price Waterhouse v. Hopkins"

Abstract: Ann Hopkins (1943–2018) was passed over for partner at Price Waterhouse (PW) in 1982 although she billed more hours than other aspiring partner candidates and obtained one of the largest deals in PW history to that date. Giving her the partnership denial news, a male PW partner cited demeanor and non-gender conforming behavior as the 'macho' reason. Hopkins sued in 1983 and finally prevailed in 1990 following the US Supreme Court holding in her favor. Hopkins lost seven years of her career before receiving her PW partnership by order of the court. Legal definitions of workplace discrimination were expanded to include gender stereotyping of men and women. Constructive discharge (legal condition necessary for a monetary remedy) was extended to career-ending circumstances including denial of partnership. Hopkins's legal quest was situated in the gendered notions of her time and the gendered construction of the accounting underscores her profession. The study contributions expanding opportunities for women in accounting and other professions.



"Norval Hawkins: Ford Accountant and Salesman Extraordinaire"

Abstract: This article investigates the life and career of Norval (1867-1936), a successful Hawkins accountant at Ford Motor of salesmanship books. and acclaimed Company author was, however a convicted felon in a Standard Oil embezzlement scheme. The early years of Ford enjoyed phenomenal growth, the introduction of the Model especially after of accounting and sales remained Oversight under James Couzens, from the company's inception in 1903, but less is known about the role of accountant salesman and Norval whose contributions Hawkins, included cost branch accounting systems and a unique dealership structure. Beyond his sales skills, Hawkins created accounting and publication, the Ford Times. to influence salespeople, customers, and dealers. Ultimately, his style and success irritated company founder Henry Ford, and Hawkins was abruptly ousted. Primary archival material from The Ford was retrieved Henry information on Hawkins' years at Ford from 1907-1919.



Abstract
