#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This has been a busy year for the AAPG. Much has been accomplished. However, much remains to be done; the work of the AAPG is never finished.

As the year began, the AAPG had 255 members. The Board of Governors decided that a membership drive was important and set a goal of having 300 members by the end of the fiscal year. As of March 1, 1990, our goal was met; the AAPG had exactly 300 members on that date. And it's my genuine privilege to welcome all of the new members. The drive is continuing, however, because the real goal was, and is, to serve as many accounting chairpersons as possible by involving them in the work and benefits of the AAPG.

As usual, the Annual Seminar was a highpoint of the year. Over 30 individuals attended the New Chairperson's Seminar and nearly 200 attended the Annual Seminar. The goal of the 1990 Seminar Committee was to design and deliver a program that served you well; according to the feedback that I received, the Committee was successful.

The 1991 Seminar Committee is already hard at work. The Seminar that that Committee is planning will be held on February 3-5, 1991, at the San Diego Marriott. Please give your ideas and support to Jan Williams, AAPG President Elect, Connie Konstans, Chair of the 1991 Seminar Committee, and the rest of the 1991 Committee as they work with your best interest in mind.

I am currently receiving feedback about the regional programs. And I am pleased to report favorable reactions. It's unfortunate that these excellent programs were not conveniently accessible to every member of the AAPG. Perhaps in the future the "Proceedings" of our AAPG Regional Programs can be made available to the entire membership.

Other, perhaps less visible but none-the-less important, committees have been hard at work this year also. The Practice Involvement Committee established a liaison relationship with the Accounting Education Change Commission, the Accreditation Committee provided direct input to the AACSB's Accreditation Project Task Force, and the Administrative Support Committee published its first report about literature that has significant potential to help you in your ad-

ministrative role. In addition, the Practice Involvement Committee and the Accreditation Committee continued their on-going work of, respectively, encouraging greater interface between the academic and practicing communities and liaisoning with the AACSB, including nominating AAA members for AACSB committee appointments. The Data Base Committee continued its fine work related to the AAPG Salary Data Base. And the Newsletter functioned so smoothly and effectively as a communication device that all of us were well informed.

In the future you should anticipate at least one white paper from the Practice Involvement Committee on the interfacing phenomenon mentioned above. You should anticipate that the Accreditation Committee will accelerate and strengthen its liaison role with the AACSB. You should expect the Administrative Support Committee to add to its list of helpful literature and to annotate each entry. And you should expect the Data Base Committee to revise the questionnaire in response to suggestions from the Board and, perhaps, to facilitate the collection of other potentially useful data.

An Ad Hoc Committee to Review the By-Laws recommended several changes in the AAPG By-Laws. The nature of the recommendations included changes in the membership requirements, clarification of the authority to issue position statements, redefinition of certain officers' roles, and some editorial changes. The Board of Governors has endorsed the recommendations of the Committee. I anticipate that you will also.

The Nominating Committee has selected an exceptionally strong slate of officers and Board of Governors nominees. I encourage you to give the new officers and Board your strong support.

Finally, I want you to know that I have enjoyed being your president this year. Thanks to each of you for your support. A special thanks to everyone who worked for the AAPG in any capacity this year.

I am looking forward to seeing you in Toronto. Our meeting will be in the City Hall Room of the Sheraton Centre Hotel, Wednesday, August 8, 1990, 4:00 p.m. – 5:30 p.m.

## ADMINISTRATORS OF ACCOUNTING PROGRAMS GROUP MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING

November 12, 1989

The Board of Governors of AAPG met on November 12th in Chicago at the O'Hare Hilton. President Dwayne Dowell opened the meeting at 9:00 a.m. In attendance were William Bentz, Lanny Chasteen, Raymond Dockweiler, Dwayne Dowell, Constantine Konstans, Bernard Milano, James Peters, James Smith, Gary White, and Jan Williams.

James Smith distributed the minutes of the August 13th Board meeting in Honolulu. Jan Williams commented on the desirability of continuing to prepare integrated minutes for the Board meeting at the AAA Annual Meeting even though two separate Board meetings actually occur. The minutes were approved without any amendments.

Lanny Chasteen presented the treasurer's report. For the fiscal year that ended August 31, 1989, the fund balance was \$23,750. Cash receipts for the period September 1, 1988 through August 31, 1989 were \$16,663 and cash disbursements were \$14,883. Several reclassifications and one additional charge for the Ohio region for \$133 were discussed.

Lanny Chasteen also presented the budget for the fiscal year September 1, 1989 through August 31, 1990. After discussion and revision by the Board, projected receipts are \$13,500 and projected expenditures are \$21,250 with a projected fund balance at the end of the fiscal year of \$16,000.

In discussing the budget, the decision was made to continue to mail all expenses incurred by Board members and committee members to Sarasota for reimbursement, but to also provide Treasurer Chasteen with a copy of the expense reimbursement request. The decision also was made to include in the budget information on both the receipts and expenditures for the Annual Seminar rather than only the net amount. In addition, the Board discussed the desirability of requiring that the fund balance at the beginning of the fiscal year be equal to either one year's dues or one-half year's expenditures. Included was the discussion of a possible dues increase as a result of this requirement and the expanding activities of AAPG. After substantial discussion, a motion was made by Jan Williams to require that the fund balance at the beginning of the fiscal year be equal to one-half of the annual expenditures. After subsequent discussion, a motion was made and approved to table the original motion. Finally, the Board decided that in the future that the annual budget should be available at the August meeting of the Board.

Gary White reported for the Accreditation Committee. As a result of the importance of the activities of the AACSB Accreditation Project Task Force, AAA President John Simmons appointed an AAA Accreditation Committee for the fiscal year. However, this committee consists of the members of AAPG's Accreditation Committee and William Bentz and Thomas Keller. The charge of the committee was to monitor the activities of the task force and to keep the AAA executive committee informed of the task force activities. After meeting in Honolulu, the individual members of the task force prepared a statement of position on the accreditation process. Gary White integrated these position papers into a single document. After being reviewed by the committee members, the report was submitted to the task force vice-chairman, Donald Skadden. Gary White emphasized that the report pointed out that the committee had not approved the report, that the AAPG Board had not yet seen the report, and the AAPG membership had not voted on it. William Bentz discussed the activities of the task force to date and provided the Board with greater insight into the task force activities. He also pointed out that opportunities would be provided at the Annual Seminar in Fort Lauderdale in February to discuss the project with members of the task force (e.g., "open hearings" will be held). The Board instructed President Dowell to discuss with AAA President Simmons the desirability of the AAA Executive Committee issuing a position statement on accreditation. The overlapping AAA/AAPG Accreditation Committees could be used to draft the statement.

Bernard Milano summarized the discussions which occurred recently on accreditation at the AICPA Education Executive Committee meeting in Atlanta including the benefits of accreditation and the task force project.

Gary White presented the AAPG Accreditation Committee's list of nominees for the three AACSB accounting accreditation committees. After revision by the Board, the list is now ready for submission to AAA President Simmons who will submit the list as modified by AAA to AACSB. An issue raised in revising the list was whether individuals who are not associated with accredited accounting programs should be included on AAPG's list. This issue will be discussed more in the future.

James Peters reported for the Administrative Support Committee. He provided the Board with a committee report which included biographical data on literature which is potentially helpful to AAPG members in their administrative roles. The report will be published in the Fall-Winter Newsletter.

Bernard Milano reported for the Annual Seminar Committee. The program has been prepared and the program brochures have been mailed to the membership. Several Board members commented on the quality of the program that Thomas Evans and his committee has prepared. A potential program committee chairman for the Annual Seminar to be held in February, 1991 was discussed. The desirability of the program committee for 1991 commencing their activities shortly after the February, 1990 seminar was discussed.

Raymond Dockweiler reported for the Database Committee. Based on his discussions with the committee chairman, John Smith, the annual AAPG salary survey is in process. The committee is discussing revisions that will make the survey more useful in the future to accounting administrators. The committee also is working on developing techniques to improve participation in the survey. The Board approved the committee recommendation that AAPG should continue to conduct its own survey rather than continuing discussions at this time regarding integration of AAPG's salary survey into AACSB's salary survey. William Bentz briefly reviewed prior discussions on this issue between AAPG and AACSB. At this stage, AAPG has provided AACSB with data that can be used in assessing the comparability of the AACSB database with the AAPG database.

Constantine Konstans reported for the Newsletter Committee. Jerry Trapnell, the newsletter editor, has the Fall-Winter newsletter ready for distribution. Mailing should occur by November 15th. After reviewing a copy of the newsletter, several minor suggestions for changes were made. Constantine indicated he would ascertain if it was still possible for the changers to be made. The Spring-Summer Newsletter is scheduled for publication by June 1, 1990.

William Bentz reported for the Nominating Committee. Letters have been distributed requesting nominations. Approximately 10 have been received to date. The committee will meet on Sunday morning February 3, 1989 in Fort Lauderdale. The goal of the committee is to announce the list of nominees at the dinner on February 5th.

Dwayne Dowell reported for the Practice Involvement Committee. The planned activities of the committee for the year include the following:

 Continue to develop and implement a plan for increasing the involvement of accountants from public practice, industry, and government in the activities of the AAPG.

- Initiate efforts to establish liaison with NASBA in order to monitor NASBA's activities.
- Send representatives (to serve as observers) to each meeting of the Accounting Education Change Commission.

The Board discussed whether AAPG should be directly involved in academic administrative issues associated with the 150-hour concept. Some aspect of this issue will be discussed at the AAPG sessions to be held at the AAA regional meetings. The decision was made not to appoint a task force at this time, but to re-examine the desirability of doing so at the time the Practice Involvement Committee is appointed next year.

Jan Williams reported for the Regional Activities Committee. All the regional vice-presidents except one met on November 11th with Vice President Williams to discuss the regional activities at the Spring AAA regional meetings. President Dowell was also in attendance. The general theme for most of the AAPG sessions at the regional meetings will be academic administrative issues as they relate to the 150-hour program.

William Bentz reported for the ad-hoc By-laws Committee. The charge of the committee includes looking at the clarity of the by-laws language, possible revision of the requirements for AAPG membership, and who should be able to issue position statements for AAPG. Various approaches for modifying the requirements for membership (e.g., open membership, membership for current and former accounting administrators) were explored and referred to the committee for evaluation. The issue of the frequency of business meetings was also raised. Presently, business meetings can only occur at the AAPG meeting held in conjunction with the AAA meeting in August. The committee is to expand the by-laws provision on this issue to enable a business meeting to also be held in conjunction with the Annual Seminar in February.

Various sites for the 1991 Annual Seminar were discussed. Paul Gerhardt is to explore the availability of facilities in Phoenix and San Diego.

President Dowell reported on activities underway to increase AAPG membership. Discussion followed on whether the policy of mailing the newsletter to all accounting administrators should be continued or whether it should be mailed only to those who are AAPG members. For the present, the newsletter will continue to be mailed to all accounting administrators (i.e., approximately 575).

The Board meeting was adjourned at 4:00 p.m.

## ADMINISTRATORS OF ACCOUNTING PROGRAMS GROUP MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING

# February 4, 1990

The Board of Governors of AAPG met on February 4th in Fort Lauderdale at the Bahia Mar Resort. President Dwayne Dowell opened the meeting at 2:00 p.m. In attendance were William Bentz, Lanny Chasteen, Dwayne Dowell, Constantine Konstans, Bernard Milano, James Peters, Larry Scott, James Smith, Lawrence Tomassini, Gary White, and Jan Williams.

James Smith distributed the minutes of the November 12th Board Meeting in Chicago. Lanny Chasteen requested one correction regarding the preparation of revised financial statements. The minutes were approved with this one correction.

Lanny Chasteen presented the treasurer's report. Cash receipts for the period September 1, 1989 through December 31, 1989 were \$7,860 and cash disbursements were \$8,979. The fund balance at December 31, 1989 was \$22,641. Due to the December 31 cut-off for the financial statement, only \$1,250 of the annual dues had been received by that date. The procedure and timeliness of Sarasota's reporting of the Annual Seminar expenses was discussed. It was noted that the newsletter costs are increasing. The procedure for mailing expense reimbursement requests to Sarasota with a copy to Treasurer Chasteen appears to be working satisfactorily

Gary White reported for the Accreditation Committee. The committee is standing ready to respond to the recommendations of the AACSB Accreditation Project Task Force. President Dowell has notified AAA President Simmons of AAPG's continuing interest in the activities of the task force. Several sessions on the Annual Seminar program deal with this issue including an open hearing with three members of the task force.

James Smith raised an issue regarding the relationship between being an accredited program and attendance at the AAA's New Faculty Consortium. Jan Williams suggested that perhaps a more appropriate issue to address would be the broader issue of the eligibility requirements for both this consortium and the Senior Faculty Consortium. Discussion followed on whether this was a germane issue for AAPG. The conclusion was that it is an appropriate issue in that it impacts directly on accounting administrators. Vice-President Williams will consider appointing a committee to deal with this issue during his term of office as President.

Jan Williams has had some preliminary discus-

sions with Alvin Arens, AAA President-Elect, regarding coordination between AAPG and AAA with respect to the accreditation project and also with respect to coordination in general between AAPG and AAA. Several Board members provided suggestions regarding the appropriate role of AAPG.

James Peters reported for the Administrative Support Committee. The biographical data list on literature which is potentially helpful to AAPG members in their administrative roles is being distributed at the New Chairpersons' Seminar. The goal of the committee is to provide annual updates of the list. The committee presently is looking for additional items to include. Such additions will be published in the newsletter.

Bernard Milano reported for the Annual Seminar Committee. Thirty-one participants were registered for the New Chairpersons' Seminar and 190 were registered for the Annual Seminar. The Board complimented Tom Evans and his program committee for the outstanding program they had prepared.

Dwayne Dowell reported for the Database Committee. The annual report of the committee was issued during the previous week and members should be receiving their copies shortly. Doyle Williams has notified Dwayne that USC's legal counsel has expressed the view that the reporting of prospective salary data could be viewed as a violation of federal anti-trust laws. The committee will examine the database questionnaire to ascertain what questions need to be revised or omitted.

Bernard Milano indicated that FSA would like to discuss including additional questions on the questionnaire so that data could be categorized by FSA members. The Board agreed for the Database Committee to examine the questions and to submit a recommendation to the Board.

Constantine Konstans reported for the Newsletter Committee. Jerry Trapnell, the newsletter editor, has requests out for materials to include in the Spring-Summer edition. Gary White proposed including the statement on accreditation prepared by the Accreditation Committee in the newsletter. The Board supported the idea, but suggested that Gary prepare an abstract of the report due to space limitations. The abstract will indicate that the complete report can be obtained from Gary White. Constantine Konstans is to ascertain the reason for the increase in the cost of the Fall-Winter newsletter.

William Bentz reported for the Nominating Committee. Letters were sent out in October requesting nominations and indications of interest to serve. The committee met earlier on February 4th and prepared its slate of nominees. The nominees are being contacted to see if they will be able to serve. The slate is to be announced on Monday night at the Town Meeting if all the nominees have been contacted by them. Ballots will be mailed out by the secretary as soon as the final slate of nominees is complete. Bernard Milano suggested including a list of current officers and committee members in the Annual Seminar materials.

Lawrence Tomassini and Larry Scott reported for the Practice Involvement Committee. Larry Scott discussed the possibility of forming a task force for dealing with administrative implementation issues associated with the 150-hour requirement. Jan Williams indicated that this is the common theme for the AAPG presentations at the regional meetings. Constantine Konstans indicated that FSA has several committees addressing this issue. The Practice Involvement Committee recommended AAPG should attempt to link-up with FSA in dealing with this issue. Substantial discussion followed on the desirability and feasibility of doing so. The Board directed Dwayne Dowell and Jan Williams to initiate discussion with FSA to explore the feasibility of a joint effort.

Larry Tomassini reported that the Practice Involvement Committee met in January. In addition to continuing its liaison role with the Accounting Education Change Commission, brainstorming sessions were held on how the committee could help academicians and practitioners in working together better. The committee hopes to issue a working paper by this summer on building a bridge between the two communities. The committee also has prepared a program proposal for the AAA Annual Meeting in August on joint research being conducted by faculty members and accounting firms. Dwayne Dowell will include this proposal in the discussion with Gary Previts of the programs slot or slots allocated to AAPG.

Jan Williams reported for the Regional Activities Committee. The committee met in Chicago in November. The common theme for the regional meetings is administrative implementation issues associated with the 150-hour requirement. Jan provided the Board with a memo summarizing the planned programs of 4 of the 7 regions. Data on the planned programs were due by January 15th. Jan has requested that the three "tardy" regional vice-presidents submit their plans and has provided all the regional vice-presidents with the plans submit-

ted by the others. After the regional programs are completed, the regional vice-presidents are to provide Jan with a report on the program.

Larry Tomassini inquired whether the regional meeting programs could be taped or proceedings prepared so the materials could be made available to accounting administrators unable to attend. Discussion followed on ways to achieve this objective including having speakers provide an outline of their presentation. Jan Williams recommended delaying doing so until the regional meetings in 1991 since the speakers for the 1990 regional meetings were not advised of this requirement when they agreed to participate. Jan's recommendation was accepted.

William Bentz reported for the ad-hoc By-laws Committee. The committee provided the Board with the recommended changes in the by-laws. Bill discussed the reasons for the changes. After substantial discussion of several of the recommended changes, amendments were made to three of the changes and the proposed by-laws, as amended, were approved by the Board. The proposed by-laws will be submitted to the membership in a mail ballot.

The site for the 1991 Annual Seminar was discussed. Dwayne Dowell presented the Board with information prepared by Paul Gerhardt on facilities and costs in Tucson, Phoenix, and San Diego. After considering the available facilities and costs, the Board recommended that President Dowell instruct Paul Gerhardt of the Board's preference for San Diego.

President Dowell reported on the success of the membership drive. Presently, there are 298 members of AAPG. This is a substantial increase over the 255 members on August 1st. President Dowell thanked the Board members who actively participated in the membership drive.

President Dowell indicated that the next meeting of the Board will be on August 8th at 2:00 p.m. in the Wentworth Room of the Sheraton Centre in Toronto. As soon as he has a confirmed site for the business meeting at 4:00 p.m., he will notify the Board. A coordinated agenda by Dwayne Dowell and Jan Williams will be provided as soon as it is available. The chairpersons of AAPG committees are to be notified by the Board members having liaison responsibilities that they will be presenting reports on the activities of their committees to the membership at the August 8th business meeting.

The Board meeting was adjourned at 5:35 p.m.
